



Parking facilities affect many people and as such, parking forms an essential part of a local authority's traffic management strategy. For disabled people, dedicated parking spaces provides access to employment, health, education and leisure opportunities thereby enabling them to lead independent lives.



What is the problem?

Inconsiderate, obstructive or dangerous parking can cause serious problems – like restricting access for emergency services, or putting pedestrians or motorists in danger by forcing people off pavements and into moving traffic.

What are we doing?
